Originally from Brooklyn, NY, Richard Alexis first came to Florida in 1959 to attend high school in Miami, but he didn't end up staying (at least not at that time). He had a leather-working shop in the Catskill Mountains for 40+ years and incorporated cabochons into those designs. At the time, he didn't cut his own, preferring to purchase already finished pieces.

Fast forward several years..... Richard is now a full-time Florida resident. He was a member of the Ft. Lauderdale Gem and Mineral Club when he took his first cabbing class. It ignited his passion for taking rough material and turning it into a thing of beauty. Richard has been a vendor at our club's show in November for some years with his company Art of Stone. While everyone knows how lovely faceted rubies and diamonds can be, Richard has learned with his work to find the beauty in lesser known rocks and minerals. It is on these that Richard will speak. 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## **Birthstone: Ruby**

Ruby is the red variety of the mineral corundum, colored by the element chromium. All other colors of gemquality corundum are called sapphire, which means color is key for this royal stone.

Accordingly, the name "ruby" comes from rubeus, the Latin word for red. In ancient Sanskrit, ruby translated to ratnaraj, which meant "king of precious stones." These fiery gems have been treasured throughout history for their vitality.

The chromium that gives ruby its red color also causes fluorescence, which makes rubies glow like a fire from within. Paradoxically, chromium is also what makes this gem scarce because it can cause cracks and fissures. Few rubies actually grow large enough to crystallize into fine quality gems, and these can bring even higher prices than diamonds.

Burma's Mogok Valley historically produced the finest ruby material, famous for its deep blood-red color with purplish hues. These Burmese Rubies, also called Pigeon's Blood Rubies, command a premium over



brownish or orange-tinged varieties from other regions.

The Mong Hsu region of Myanmar began producing rubies in the 90s after discovering that heat treatment improved the color saturation. Other

ruby deposits exist in Vietnam, Thailand, India, parts of the Middle East, East Africa and even the United States.

Tough and durable, ruby measures 9 on the Mohs scale. Diamond is the only natural gemstone harder than ruby.

Ruby's strength and red fluorescence make it valuable for applications beyond jewelry. Both natural and synthetic rubies are used in watchmaking, medical instruments and lasers.

Due to its deep red color, ruby has long been associated with the life force and vitality of blood. It is believed to amplify energy, heighten awareness, promote courage and bring success in wealth, love and battle.





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## **Member Highlight:**

# Dam 66Big Jake99 Jacobsom



The spotlight this month is on our member Dan Jacobson, also known as Big Jake. Dan has an interesting story that many of us can relate to.

Dan is a successful attorney who practiced law here in South Florida for over 35 years. About six years ago, he took a life-changing trip to Alaska, living in the wilderness and panning for gold. It was so exciting to him to see gold, real GOLD, in his pan.

When he came back to Florida, Dan decided to purchase some gold mining claims in Alaska, eventually opening his <u>Big Jake's Alaska Gold Panning</u> operation.

Before doing that, though, Dan closed his

law practice, sold his house, and actually drove to Alaska.

Dan currently spends his winters here with us in Florida, and his summers mining in Alaska. When he's in Florida, he works at local fairs, running a gold panning and gemstone booth. He drives back and forth between Florida and Alaska, stopping along the route to look for rocks and gems. He's had some good success on his journeys. This year, he collected emeralds and aquamarine in North Carolina, agate in Texas, fire agate and chalcedony in New




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Mexico, red and black jasper, chrysocolla, and quartz crystals in Arizona, malachite and azurite in Nevada, topaz in Utah, fire opal in Idaho, jade in British Columbia, and amethyst in Ontario!

The picture on the right shows Big Jake's operation. You can see the washplant with the water coming through



it. All the way in the back left is the water pump at the far end of a settling pond. They pump the water up to the plant and load the gravel with the excavator sitting right above it. The plant washes the gravel down and the gold stays in the sluice box which is underneath the shaker. The rest of the gravel goes into the pond, and they dig it out



and eventually put it back to recontour the land. Then they plant grasses and willows so in a few years it doesn't look like it's ever been mined.

Big Jake's mining operation is located on the border of the Yukon in Canada and Alaska, about 60 miles west of Dawson City, Yukon. The mine gathers a fair share of gold, and is also rich with garnets. This year, they found over 100 ounces of gold in a short period of time, including this gold nugget that weighs about 2.25 ounces.

If you see Dan at local fairs (such as the South Florida Fair), you'll see he's offering many of his finds for sale, including gold pay dirt bags, gold nuggets, and gemstone bags.

I have the perfect destination in mind for you - the rolling mountains of North Carolina! Why not "get away" and join the fun and happy folks at the September EFMLS Wildacres Workshop?

Held at the Wildacres Retreat in Little Switzerland, NC, our workshop features a well-known Speaker-in-



Residence as well as a variety of classes all taught by experienced, excellent instructors.

"Tuition" for the entire week of the

session is just \$410 per person and includes your room and board. The only additional out of pocket expense you'll have is for the materials fee for the class or classes you take during the week.

All of our EFMLS Workshops at Wildacres are relaxing, educational and fun. Located on a private mountain just off the Blue Ridge Parkway, the retreat is quiet. There's no traffic whizzing by, no horns honking, or blaring radios or TV to disturb the peace and quiet of the mountains. The weather in September is usually comfortable so sitting out on the wide porches or on the patio in the evenings or afternoons when there are no scheduled activities is a delight. Time spent in the classroom is generally between 10 and 20 hours depend-ing on whether you're signed up for one class that lasts the

entire week or two classes that each last half the week.

Food is always plentiful and good - no one has ever left one of the meals feeling hungry, but just in case you have the urge for some ice cream or other snack, there is a can -teen that's open each evening after the scheduled activity.

Lodging is in private bedrooms each with a private bathroom. If you come alone, you'll be assigned a roommate, or you can request a specific friend on your registration form. There is no smoking allowed in any of the buildings or on the patio or porches so there's no need to worry about your own health concerns, however the terrain is somewhat hilly. For those with physical handicaps, we do have access to a golf cart to help you move from the dining hall (at the bottom of the hill) to the residence and meeting areas.

Classes that we're offering during the September 4 - 10 session along with their descriptions and instructors are on the next page.

Our Speaker-in-Residence for the fall session is none other than Dr. Timothy Morgan. Tim has been teaching an adult ed class in Montgomery County, MD for several years now. His main interest is in gems...and we're sure he'll have talks leaning to that phase of the hobby. Tim's an engaging speaker, as well as an interesting person and we're sure that you'll enjoy spending the week with him. We're hoping that his wife Michelle will accompany him.

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## WILDACRES FALL CLASSES - SEPTEMBER 4 - 10,2017. SPEAKER-IN-RESIDENCE: TIM MORGAN

CLASS & INSTRUCTOR	DESCRIPTION
Chainmaille - Basic Roger Campbell	Learn the ancient art of chainmaille using non-soldered copper jumprings. Students will learn different weaves while completing class projects. All tools will be provided. An optivisor or other magnification would be helpful. 2-day class offered first semester. No prior experience necessary.
Chainmaille - Continued Roger Campbell	The 2nd semester class will be a short review of chainmaille and students will learn additional weaves. All tools will be provided. An optivisor or other magnification would be helpful. 2-day class offered second semester.
Faceting – Steve Weinberger	Students will learn to cut and polish a 57-facet round brilliant gemstone. In addition they will how to identify well-cut stones, select rough material and see whether they enjoy this fascinating aspect of the hobby. Students are asked to bring an optivisor and/or jeweler's loupe if you have one. 4-day class. No prior experience necessary.
Intarsia – Beginning John Milligan	Intarsia is the making of a geometric design using a variety of stones cut to precision and fitted together to form a pattern while leaving no gaps between the pieces. In this course, students will learn the beginning skills of Intarsia by melding together stones of various colors and patterns to form a finished cabochon. Students should bring an Optivisor. Prerequisite: Must have cabbing experience. Two day class offered both semesters.
Shoot Your Story/ Tell Your Story – Bruce Gaber	In this lively workshop you'll learn the basics of photography (both technical and aesthetic). Then with some simple guiding assignments we're out the door to take our best shots. Finally, working in teams, we'll assembly our images to tell our own personal stories as engaging video programs. Bring your point-and-shoot, DLSR, or smartphone. This is a four day class.
Silversmithing – Basic Richard Meszler	Have fun learning the basics of working silver sheet and wire to fabricate jewelry. The projects will introduce you to annealing/bending/shaping/texturing metal, soldering, piercing and polishing. Students will receive a kit containing the necessary metals and supplies to complete these projects as well as a detailed written step by step description of each project. 2-day class offered 1st semester. No prior experience necessary.
Silversmithing – Intermediate Richard Meszler	Continue your education working with metals by doing a more complex project. You will learn to make a bezel setting & bail into which you will set a cabochon to make a pendant. Students will receive a kit containing the necessary metals and supplies to complete this project as well as a detailed written step by step description of each project. Prerequisite: Basic silversmithing experience including soldering.
Wire Wrapping – Jacqueline Campbell Session I Session II	Using pliers, gold-filled or sterling silver wire, assorted beads or gemstones, and a few basic wirecraft techniques, learn how to create your own fashion rings, bracelets, pendants and earrings to add that perfect accent to your jewelry wardrobe or to give as gifts. All tools and materials will be provided. Session I: Designed for beginners, participants will make an adjustable ring, two bracelets, a pendant and two pairs of earrings. 2-day class offered first semester. Session II: Designed for those with some experience (or a brave beginner) participants will make a fitted ring, two pairs of earrings, a cabochon pendant and a bracelet. 2-day class offered second semester.


## **Shop Report**


